### **Antitrust:**

Robinson-Patman Act – price discrimination, federal/state; and commercial bribery

Sherman Act – conspiracy in restraint of trade, contract, combination, conspiracy to monopolize or attempt to monopolize – boycott, price fixing, acq/merger, concerted refusal to deal

Clayton Act – Section 7 – merger/act - where the effect may substantially lessen competition

### **Other Federal Statutes:**

Civil rights law – individual or business involving state action (govt creating business barriers to protect favored business)

Copyright infringement
Patent infringement
Unfair competition – Lanham Act
Securities Acts

#### **State Statutes:**

New York General Business Law Sections 349-350 prohibiting false or misleading advertising or sales techniques

## **State Claims:**

Breach of contract: oral or written, express or implied
Breach of implied covenant of good faith and fair dealing
Breach of contract in which you are a third-party beneficiary
Breach of confidentiality agreement – former employee
Interference with a contract or advantageous business relationship
Inducing breach of a contract
Breach of fiduciary duty - partner

Fraud, misrepresentation – 7 elements: (1) representation of a fact; (2) materiality of fact; (3) falsity of the representation; (4) knowledge of the falsity; (5) intent to have other rely; (6) reasonable reliance on the representation; (7) injury as a consequence.

Negligence

**Product Liability** 

Lender's Liability (all sorts of possibilities because of the toxic mortgages and derivatives) Negligent misrepresentation

"Negligence per se" violation of a statute designed to protect the public Tortious destruction of your business

Prima facie tort defined as intentional oppressive or malicious conduct designed to injure someone in his/her person, property or mind without any economic justification - in other words, tortious conduct which is obviously outrageous and not intended to reap an economic benefit, but instead designed to and which does injure the person against whom the conduct is directed (an example might be blowing up a person's store without such motivation as being a competitor or a named insured on any fire insurance policy or a landlord who wants the tenant to vacate the premises).

Libel, slander, and defamation of title Malicious Prosecution, Abuse of Process Assault, Battery, False arrest, false imprisonment Trespass Extortion Wrongful injunction
